Steps to Putting on a Condom

Directions: Number these steps so they are in the right order. To make it tricky, there's at least one unnecessary step!

Step #	Action
	Hold onto the rim of the condoms at the base of the penis. Then withdraw the penis and throw the condom in the garbage.
	Talk with your partner about the decision to have sex and the different protection options.
	Wash penis thoroughly before you put a condom on.
	Check the expiration date on the package and look for any holes, tears, or signs of damage.
	Have vaginal, oral, or anal sex.
	Place the condom on the head of the erect penis and hold the tip of the condom to squeeze out any air. Roll the condom down to cover the entire penis.
